Education Foundation Enrichment Grants make a difference in the lives of our students

Over \$16,000.00 in Education Foundation enrichment grants was awarded to Berea City School District staff members for programs that enhance students' education. The 2015-2016 Enrichment Grants include:

Model United Nations

Middleburg Heights Junior High School Recipient: Stacey Jennings

Model United Nations is a program in which students, acting as UN members, debate and present their solutions to current world and US issues. The students will participate at a Junior Model UN Conference at John Carroll University where they are evaluated on their work and work with students from other schools. This grant covers the cost of registration.

Wonder

Grindstone Elementary Recipient: Cynthia K. Millen Amount: \$450.00

Wonder is a book written by R. J. Palacio about a 10-year old homeschooled boy who has genetic abnormalities and have gone through 27 surgeries that have left disfigurations on his face. The book tells the story of how the boy adjusts to being newly enrolled in fifth grade. The story provides a platform for Grindstone students to think about the way they interact with each other. The grant will purchase these inspiring books.

Mindful Me

BPM Elementary Amount: \$5000.00 Recipients: Katie Rolland, Kristen Brandyberry, Cara McGregor The "Mindful Me" program will teach the students how to cope with daily, social-emotional, economic, and environmental stressors. Teachers will be provided with a kit of materials used to create an environment of mindfulness and a training program. Students will also receive yoga sessions with a certified instructor. The grant covers the cost of materials and training.

The goal for this program is to improve writing skills for students in the Community Based Treatment Center program. By the end of this program, each students will have created a portfolio of all his/her writing, including a poetry project. The students will design a "poem pillowcase," which they can keep as a reminder of their achievement. The grant will cover the cost of the art supplies.

One School, One Book (OSOB)

The "One School, One Book" program focuses on family literacy. Over the course of a month, students, parents and staff members will be reading a chapter book and participating in book-related activities at school. This program's goal is to improve reading literacy and to promote reading together as a family at home. This grant will cover the cost of the program.



Gabe & Izzy: Standing Up for America's Bullied

Gabrielle Ford wrote an autobiography about her inspiring life's story titled *Gabe & Izzy*. After being diagnosed with a rare muscle disease, Gabe was constantly bullied in school. Today, Gabe travels to schools across the country to speak to kids about bullying. This grant will cover the cost of the book and her presentation to all Grindstone students.

Alumni want to give students an experience to remember

When Tom Jake and his wife, Nancy Cartmell Jake, retired in 2014 and moved

back to northeast Ohio, they wanted to do something to give back to the Berea School District, where they grew up and graduated from high school.

Jake graduated from Berea High School in 1972, his wife in 1970. They lived in northern Virginia while working for the federal government but moved back to Ohio to be closer to family. That's when Jake contacted classmates about an Enrichment Grant through The Education Foundation.

"We created the grant for a couple of reasons," Jake said. "No. 1, we wanted to support the schools and The Education Foundation." But they also noticed that "things have changed so much in the schools. We wanted to do something to benefit the students."

The BHS Class of 1972 Enrichment Grant is aimed at junior high and high school students in grades 7-12 and can be awarded to classroom teachers and student group advisers. It is broadbased. Eligible programs include those that offer mentoring or shadowing experiences, guest speakers, workshops or internships. The grant also could fund equipment and supplies for special programs that would not otherwise be funded by the district. It could be used to support community service or volunteerism, to celebrate diversity, to improve and enhance academic achievement, or to support the arts, music, sciences, math, history or reading.

"We want to get to students as they begin to make career choices," Jake said. "Give them a chance to see what it's like in the work environment. We want to give them an experience they'll remember."

The BHS Class of 1972 ad hoc committee will look over the grant applications and make recommendations to The Education Foundation, which will make the final selection. The first grant of \$500 will be awarded for the 2016-17 school year.
